



## Rural Generalist Coordination Unit

### 2022-23 Scholarships and Training Support Guidelines - Emergency Medicine Certificate or Emergency Medicine Diploma

January 2023

## Introduction

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The Rural Generalist Program South Australian (RGPSA) was introduced for the commencement of the 2021 training year and aims to coordinate and build on existing structures and services for the delivery of training.

The RGPSA responds to the Australian Government's Stronger Rural Health Strategy for the National Rural Generalist Pathway and the requirement for the implementation of Rural Generalist Coordination Units in each state and territory, linked to Commonwealth funding.

The RGPSA seeks to align with the National Rural Generalist Pathway, noting that South Australia has a range of variables that need to be considered, such as state junior medical workforce influences, the construct of rural postgraduate medical training programs and the unique geographical and demographical make up of SA.

## Supporting Rural Medical Training in South Australia

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Supporting rural junior doctors and Fellowed GPs with access to further training including advanced or additional skills, as well as upskilling and learning opportunities, is a key strategy of the RGPSA. To support access, the RGPSA is offering funding for junior doctors and Fellowed GPs to access a range of courses including covering course fees.

These guidelines are for funding to support achievement of Emergency Medicine Certificate (EMC) or Emergency Medicine Diploma (EMD) to increase the skills base of rural GPs in South Australia.

## Definitions

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The following definitions apply to this document:

- Clinical Lead: Supports the advanced skills training for general practitioners in regional South Australia
- Funding body: refers to the Rural Support Service, Barossa Hills Fleurieu Local Health Network
- Primary location: refers to the primary site at which the trainee will be based
- Trainee: is the registrar or Fellowed GP undertaking training
- Training year: refers to the PGY2+ training year February to February annually
- Supervisor: the doctor providing supervision during the training period. They may be a GP proceduralist or a visiting specialist in the health service



- Primary Mentor: refers to the actively practicing rural generalist with the required specialist skills (Rural Generalist Emergency Medicine) who will be working at the same location as the trainee during their training; and
  - has agreed to oversee/supervise the trainee's training including the development and review of their learning plan; and
  - is the primary ongoing support person during the trainee's training.
- Training Organisation: The organisation that provides the training for the trainee. This may include Felloved GPs or registrars with ACRRM or RACGP-RG.

## Eligibility

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Support under the RGPSA's Scholarships and Training Support is available for medical practitioners where they are:

- living and working in a rural community MMM 3 -7 locations; and are a
- South Australian rural prevocational trainee, or
- South Australian rural generalist registrars or Felloved GP with ACRRM or RACGP-RG

## Requirements

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RGPSA Scholarships and Training Support applications will be required to:

- Identify the training course or qualification and support required for the trainee to be able to complete the course or qualification and the funding sought for each; and
- Identify in which community the trainee intends to practice their skills during and/or following the training.

## Funding

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Scholarships and Training Support may cover multiple activities and should be applied for before the commencement of the training activity. All funds must be used towards activities for training and development and are not to be used to address workforce shortages in a health service.

### Eligible funding items:

Funding accessed via the RGPSA Scholarships and Training Support can be utilised for the following expenses:

- Course fees for Emergency Medicine Certificate or diploma and associated ACEM training requirements i.e. ALS2, PALS and ETM or equivalent.
- Other emergency related short course may also be considered in special circumstances
- Payment to a health service for supervision e.g. where no other training program funding is already being accessed to provide supervision to the trainee
- Other courses may be considered on a case by case basis and subject to funding availability



## Funding payments

RGPSA Scholarships and Training Support funds will be paid as follows:

For trainees:

- following submission of the application form and notification that the trainee has been granted funding for the course(s) applied for (successful applicants)
- reimbursement of training costs following submission of receipts and completion of short course; and/or
- reimbursement of enrolment fees for qualification e.g. EMC/EMD following submission of receipts and commencement of training.

For other supports:

- Supervision: via recharge arrangements for supervision to the local health network (LHN) as agreed between the Rural Generalist Coordination Unit, Rural Support Service within the Barossa Hills Fleurieu Local Health Network (BHFLHN) and the LHN where the trainee, to meet their training requirements, needs to access FACEM supervision, when not available at their usual place of work; or
- other arrangements as required.

\* Applications for ALS2, APLS and ETM individually will also be accepted where they support the achievement of the EMC or EMD. Other emergency courses may also be considered under special circumstances.

\*\*Access to FACEM supervision, where it is not available at the trainee's current place of employment, can be achieved via undertaking the relevant placement hours at the Mt Barker District Soldiers Memorial Hospital – Emergency Department or other site in certain circumstances. This will need to be negotiated between the trainee's rLHN and BHFLHN. The RGPU will assist to facilitate this.

In your application, please indicate which package or component you would like funding support for.

## Responsibilities

### Trainee

- Attend and participate in the funded training course or qualification to the best of their ability;
- Meet all obligations and course work as required; and
- Sign up to the Rural Generalist Program South Australia. Visit <https://www.ruralgeneralist.sa.gov.au/> for all the details on the RGPSA and how to sign up.
- Not access professional development reimbursement when accessing RGPSA scholarship funding
- Submit all receipts and reimbursement requests within 1 month of completing each training component

### RGPU

- Provide the funding as outlined in these Scholarships and Training Support guidelines;
- Negotiate and support, where relevant, for trainee to access to FACEM supervision; and
- Provide assistance and/or intervention as required for any issues or barriers for trainees in completing their course.



## Applications

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Applications are to be submitted using the RGPSA Scholarships and Training Support application form.

## Trainees

Applications for Scholarships and Training Support must be submitted prior to commencement of the training course or qualification.

Support can be provided by the RGPU through the RGPSA Rural Generalist Clinical Lead and Advisors for general advice and to assist with the identification of suitable placement sites, where applicable.

The trainee should work with their training organisation, college and primary location health service to develop suitable placement for a Scholarships and Training Support application, where applicable. Please contact the RGPU to discuss your needs and for assistance.

## Assessment Criteria

Each application will be assessed on a case by case basis. Assessment criteria include:

- Community need for the skill set;
- Trainee's training requirements and commitment to working in regional South Australia;
- Overall medical workforce skills needs for regional South Australia;
- Proposed planned funding expenditure
- Funding availability

## Learning Plan Details – for EMC/EMD qualifications only

The Learning Plan details should outline how the training will progress, the supervision structure and review timelines to complete the qualification and should be submitted on the Learning Plan template.

## Appendix 1:

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### Rural accredited training sites with supervision capacity

Emergency Medicine Certificate (EMC) and Diploma (EMD): The below sites can meet the 80hrs (Certificate) and 160hrs (Diploma) of FACEM supervision with an EMC/EMD Supervisor on site. Where other sites are chosen and cannot meet the above supervision requirements locally, the trainee will need to relocate for this component to be able to complete the qualification. Support for relocation and identification of a suitable site can be provided. Please discuss your needs with the RGPU.
